


1st All Souls Saturday

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An Icon of an Icon of Repentance | The Prodigal Son

The third Sunday before the start of Great Lent is dedicated to the **Parable of the Prodigal Son**. This parable is celebrated in the prefasting period because it is considered in Eastern Christianity as a perfect reflection, or icon, of the nature of sin and the nature of repentance.

Jesus' parable of the Prodigal (in Greek: Η παραβολή του ασώτου υιού) is the final part of a trilogy of parables, told together after the Pharisees and Scribes grumbled among themselves that Christ was eating with sinners. Within the hearing of those assembled, Jesus delivers the parable of the Good Shepherd, the parable of the Lost Coin, and finally the parable of the Prodigal (wasteful) Son which we heard in Liturgy today:

(Luke 15:11-31)

The parable describes sin as a kind of exile from our Father's house, where we are the younger son. Inside the house is salvation; outside is a life of starving among the swine. Our exile is not enforced: the young son chose to leave the house and waste his inheritance on things which did not last. We are the same while we continue to squander the things we have, all of which are gifts from God. Neither are we barred from returning: all the young son did was to come to his senses ("he came to himself") and realize that he didn't need to live this way. The son decided to return to his father, not as a son coming to reclaim

his inheritance, but as a hired slave willing to serve.

This is the heart of humble repentance: realizing the treasures of the "Father's house" and having the sense and will to rise up and turn back home. In doing so we forget our pride, admit all the things we have done wrong, and throw ourselves on our Father's mercy. The results of such an act are shown in the parable.

And in doing this we make sure we don't then become like the elder brother. Despite working diligently for his father and receiving the blessings of life there, the elder brother, upon seeing the wasteful son being accepted back, refused to enter the house in anger. By doing so, he put himself outside the father's house, representing salvation. The father calls him back — "you are always with me, and all that I have is yours" — but Jesus leaves the parable open as to whether the older son returns.

The Icon of the Parable of the Prodigal Son

The parable of the prodigal in iconography is usually found as frescoes on church walls, reminding the faithful of its lessons. Often, the main image shown is the embrace of father and son, cloaks billowing as the two fall upon the other's neck in love. This bulletin's first page provides a good example of such an image.

To the left is the prodigal son despondent among the swine, while to the right he has returned to the father, shown unmistakably as Jesus Christ.

Above them is an empty throne surrounded by angels; a heavenly throne. It is empty because Jesus Christ our God descended from heaven and became man so that while we, as repentant sinners, were "still a great way off", He could rush out to meet us. Knowing those of us who have come to our senses and risen up, Jesus Christ runs the greater distance

to embrace us, clothe us, feed us, and bring us into the Father's house.

When I foolishly spurned Your Fatherly glory, I squandered the riches You had given me on evil deeds. So now I cry out to You with the voice of the prodigal son: I have sinned against You, O merciful Father; accept my repentance and treat me as one of Your hired servants.

(Kontakion for the Sunday of the Prodigal)

From the Catechism "Christ our Pascha"

Repentance

Christ, the Good Shepherd, who came to find the "lost sheep," calls all to repentance: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Mt 4:17). Without repentance, there can be neither salvation nor new life. In the Parable of the Prodigal Son, Christ reveals the essence of repentance as a return to the Father and the acceptance of his gift of forgiveness. In repentance, we come to know God as a loving and merciful Father. He accepts repentant sinners and rejoices at their conversion, "for he is good and loves mankind."

Repentance allows a Christian not only to experience God as a merciful Father, but to rediscover oneself in God's embrace—to see oneself as the son who returned from the foreign land of sin to the Father's home of righteousness. On the Sunday of the Prodigal Son, the Church sings: "As the Prodigal Son I come to you, merciful God. I have wasted my whole life in a foreign land; I have scattered the wealth which you gave me, O Father. Receive me in repentance, O God, and have mercy on me."

My love for you brought Me to earth, and I suffered all things for the sake of your salvation, and I want you all to know my love, and to say, like the apostles on Tabor: Lord, it is good for us to be with You."

(St. Silouan the Athonite, *Writings*, IX.27)

Whoever hates his sins will stop sinning; and whoever confesses them will receive remission. A man can not abandon the habit of sin if he does not first gain enmity toward sin, nor can he receive remission of sin without confession of sin. For the confession of sin is the cause of true humility.

(St. Isaac the Syrian, *Homilies*, 71)

All those requesting the Holy Mysteries of Initiation or Crowning <u>must</u> be registered parishioners for at least six months, attend Liturgical Services on Sunday and days of Precept, and support the work and growth of the parish.

Mysteries of Initiation: Requires Pre-Baptismal instruction. The Mysteries of Initiation are celebrated on Saturdays or Sundays within the Divine Liturgy. At least one sponsor must be a Catholic and the other a practicing Christian. Both sponsors must present documentation that they are in good standing with their church.

Mystery of Crowning: Requires Pre-Marriage instruction. Consult Fr. James at least six months prior to making wedding plans. Marriages cannot be celebrated during the fasting seasons of the Church.

Funerals: Contact Fr. James.

Liturgy, Panahida and Eternal Lamp Intentions: Schedule with Fr. James. It is "holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead" (2 Maccabees 12:46) especially on the 9th and 40th days, and on the anniversary of their falling asleep in the Lord.

Holy Mystery of Confession: Confession is available Saturdays from 4:00 - 4:45 PM or by appointment.

Sick calls / Holy Anointing / Hospital Visits: Requested by parishioner, friend, or family.

Call anytime in case of an emergency.

Please submit all Bulletin announcements to Fr. James for approval by Wednesday of each week.
